As I sit writing this, I look outside and see that some of the trees are still hold-

ing onto their fall colors, while most have lost them completely. Temperatures are beginning to fall and soon we will be looking at the snowcovered ground. By the time you read this, we will be almost halfway through our school year. It's going by very quickly.

As our school year rapidly passes by, we continue to focus on four goals: Culture, Safety and Security, Technology and being a "Model District."

Our focus on culture centers on the belief that every decision we make begins with the premise that we do what's in the best interest of our students. We believe a strong positive culture and focusing on our students will keep us centered and allow us to make decisions for the right reasons.

We strongly believe that educating our students and keeping each of them safe are our primary responsibilities as educators. We take keeping our students safe seriously. This is exemplified by our ongoing efforts to evaluate and provide measures that will ensure this safe environment. Over the summer, our district installed devices in each classroom that, in the event of an intruder or active shooter, will increase their chances of being safely secured in an area away from the active threat. We are ongoing in our efforts to identify other potential opportunities to keep our students safe and secure while at school.

Twenty-first century students are exposed to very different ways of obtaining information than we

ever dreamed possible. We thought that a "video phone" and flat screen TV were just ideas we saw on "The Jetsons," never realizing that one day we would be using our 60" TV to talk to someone on the other side of the world using our iPhone and Apple TV. The fact is, these are realities. These devices and many others have a tremendous impact on how our children and grandchildren learn. We are committed to continuing to update our curriculum to include technology that best enhances and assists our students to the realities of 21st century learning.

Finally, I have challenged our district faculty to become a "Model District." We want to be a district that other districts aspire to emulate. This concept can take on many shapes, i.e., innovative ways in which we educate our students to finding ways to interact with and develop ways to partner with our

community. Two examples of this are our new garden bars which allow our students healthy, desirable food choices for lunches and our middl school students who have taken on service learning projects where our students develop innovative ways to meet needs within our community.

At the beginning of the school year, we as a district adopted the motto: Accept the Challenges and Embrace the Opportunities. The Harrisonville School District is committed to face any challenges that may come our way and embrace them in an ongoing effort to create a positive environment that puts the educational interests of the children of our district and making educating all our students our top priority.

# Athletic Booster Club open to all parents, supports all programs

The Harrisonville Athletic Booster Club supports district sports and activities and is open to any and all parents who would like to participate.

The Booster Club has provided over \$163,000 in funding to activities' programs over the last five years. Major purchases include drop-down volleyball nets, wrestling mats, soccer nets, high jump pit mattress, uniforms for basketball and football, Special Olympics bowling equipment, weight room equipment at HMS and HHS, and laptops for activities usage.

The Booster Club oversees the concession stands at sporting events

which is the group's major fundraiser. In recent years, they have reconfigured the concession area at Memorial Stadium and built a new storage facility at the stadium to improve the concession experience.

One of the most visual signs of the Booster Club are the Big Blue buses which provide transportation for many student groups from sports teams, to band and choir, to DECA and debate. The Booster Club owns two buses and contracts with the district to provide transportation to events

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# Criminal Justice program provides students training, experience for future

A new program at Cass Career Center is providing students with opportunities to explore a new field of interest. The Criminal Justice/ CSI program is in its first year. Thirty students are enrolled in the course with 15 taking the morning block and 15 enrolled in the afternoon block.

The students are learning about a variety of areas related to criminal justice. Areas already covered this year include criminal justice system, Bill of Rights with focus on the 4th, 5th, 6th, 8th and 14th Amendments, basic patrol procedures as it pertains to radio traffic and basic traffic stops for law enforcement, and the court system.

The class provides many handson experiences that students enjoy.

Senior Kristen Storm said, "I enjoy the practical aspect of the class that gives you practice on what you will do everyday as a police officer, lawyer, or within other criminal justice jobs."

The students have also had the chance to hear from a variety of guest speakers including Joel Sealer with the FBI; Courtney Totte who talked about the hiring process and demonstrated a polygraph; and Kim Case, a victim advocate, who talked about her personal story of survival and the impact the criminal justice system can have on victims.

Senior Baylee Streit said, "When we had Kim Case in class it was really eye opening. It was scary and awful, but it made me think and now I have a better understanding of what it is like as an officer to approach someone in that much distress and pain. I also loved the traffic stop unit because it gave me an idea of what it is like to be an officer."

Beyond criminal justice skills, the students are also learning skills that are important in any field.

"I enjoy the amount of teamwork that has to be done in the law enforcement branch. We are shown how important it is to communicate with other students and how teamwork could mean life or death in the field of police work," said junior Dylan Bell.

Parents are also seeing the benefits of the program.

"My student loves this class. His interest in the program grows more with each topic they learn," said Shawn Wright. "He has a desire to succeed in this class. I have never seen him so passionate about a subject throughout his academic career."

Local law enforcement agencies including the Cass County Sheriff's Office and the Harrisonville Police

Department have pledged support to the program with field trips to each facility scheduled.

Many students are planning to pursue criminal justice studies beyond high school.

Streit

said, "I enrolled in this class because I knew I was going to major in criminal justice, and I felt it was a perfect opportunity to really get to know what I was majoring in. I knew that if I took this class and loved it, I would have confirmation for my future job, but if it wasn't meant to be I would know as well."

"I think this class is truly great in the way it helps prepare the individuals for the field they are wanting to go into along the lines of law enforcement," said senior Brittany Wagner.

Criminal Justice/CSI is taught by Officer Chandra Kelly. Officer Kelly graduated from the Johnson County Regional Police Academy

and was an officer in Johnson County, Kansas for 10 years working for both the Overland Park and Olathe Police Departments. She was a defensive tactics, ASP and PPCT instructor at Overland Park.

"Officer Kelly has blown me away with her dedication and teaching abilities. For being her first time in a school, it's like she has been teaching for years," said Streit. "They couldn't have hired a better person for the job."

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# Parents As Teachers open to all district families

Harrisonville Parents As Teachers is a home-school-community partnership designed to give all children the best possible start in life. The program is open to all families in the Harrisonville School District with children ages birth to kindergarten.

Harrisonville Parents As Teacher provides a variety of opportunities for participants including personal visits, group meetings, screenings, and a referral network.

PAT certified parent educators, trained in early childhood development, provide personal visits to each family's home. The educators help parents understand each stage of their child's development and offer practical tips on ways to encourage learning. Parents discover simple, everyday activities - meal time or a trip to the grocery store - are opportunities to develop their child's basic skills.

During group meetings, parents

get together to gain new insights and to share their experiences, common concerns, and successes. Group meetings also provide families the opportunity to participate in parent-child activities.

Each week that school is in session, PAT holds Sharing Times Playgroup on Tuesday morning from 9:15-10:15 a.m. This is open

to parents and children, and it is also a great time for grandparents and home child care workers to connect with others too. Children have the opportunity to socialize through play, hands-on activities, and snack

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tion, PAT holds regular evening activities. In September, families participated in Transportation Fun and Safety Night featuring vehicles from a variety of agencies including the fire and police departments, Durham School Services, the library, and ani-

mal shelter. In November and again in February, families can take part in Wild and Wacky. Wild and Wacky is an event focused on physical activity at which children crawl, climb, and slide through an obstacle course made up of large soft objects. The next Wild and Wacky events are scheduled for February 13 at 6 p.m. and February 14 at 9:15 a.m.

PAT also offers periodic screening of overall development, language, hearing, and vision. The goal is to provide early detection of potential problems to prevent difficulties later in school.

Finally, PAT helps families link with special services, if needed.

Enrollment for the 2017-2018 Practical Nursing class has begun! Go to www.casscareercenter.com and click on "Practical Nursing" to get more information or to request an information packet. Upon satisfactory completion of

the program, graduates are eligible to apply to the Missouri State Board of Nursing for permission to take the licensing examination. A passing score on the exam qualifies the graduate for Licensed Practical Nursing (LPN) status in Missouri.

Financial Aid is available to qualified students. Individuals wishing to apply to the program must have a high school diploma or GED and obtain a satisfactory score on a general knowledge entrance exam. (ATI TEAS exam) A \$65 non-refundable testing fee must be submitted to reserve a testing spot for the ATI TEAS exam. Due to limited testing space and class size, potential students are advised to test early. Please go to www.casscareercenter.com and choose Practical Nursing Program. Go to Admissions-How to Apply to fill out an online application, to print reference forms and register for the ATI TEAS exam.

Applicants must take and pass the ATI TEAS exam to be eligible for consideration to the PN program. PRE-REGISTRATION FOR TESTING IS A MUST!!!- Exams are given at Cass Career Center. You can test 2 times and you MUST allow 21 days between tests. You will not be officially registered until we receive the testing fee. All applications, reference forms and testing must be completed by March 31, 2017.





# HHS students, teachers reflect on addition of student laptops

The 2016-17 school year marks the third year for Harrisonville High School as a 1:1 school. All students are given a laptop computer to use and the initiative has definitely changed classroom learning. We asked a few teachers and students to share their thoughts...

How has teaching and learning changed/improved since students received personal devices?

Before 1:1 you had to plan pretty far ahead if you wanted to include any type of technology. Computer labs booked out weeks in advance. Now, if you think of something on the way to school you can easily adjust your lesson to be more tech friendly. Kids love looking up information and I try to give them the chance to do it as often as possible. - Mrs. Emily Terwilliger, social studies

The best example for me of this initiative is the Google Classroom and the capabilities it gives to learning. I had kids turning in assignments at 10 p.m. on a Friday night to meet the due date before midnight. These kids are being trained to be a part of this 21st century and the opportunities technology gives us. We are busy people and our kids are so involved in so many different things. With their MacBooks, they can stay connected with each other at any time of day. - Mrs. BryAnn Middleton, social studies

As for foreign language, students can hear the pronunciation of the words more than just from the teacher. They can then practice it more as well. Students can do different activities that are computer generated and graded so they get instant feedback. It creates more individualized learning and students can work at their own pace. We use multiple electronic educational games both in

and out of the classroom, which creates an environment with higher student engagement. - Mrs. Jenny Wickstrom, Spanish

Most of the teachers in the high school use either Google Classroom or Canvas as a learning management system. Students can have access to every assignment, worksheet, PowerPoint, and notes without being in the class. Having a personal device allows students to access the Parent Portal and keep up with their grades and missing assignments in their courses. - Ms. Allison Willson, math

The classroom as become very digitalized. More assignments are due at 11:59 p.m., instead of the next day of class. - Senior Baylee Streit

What are the benefits to being 1:1? We live in a digital world and a BIG part of our job as a public institution is to train these kids for the real world. Technology is only going to increase in these kids' lives and before long everything is going to be paperless, so we must teach these kids how to do things electronically and how to have self control over their technology. Yes, it can be a huge distraction at times, but back in the 90's note passing was a distraction. - Mrs. Middleton

Not all families can afford a device like the Mac. The memory, the ease of use, and the ability to get online has leveled the playing field significantly for some of our kids. - Mrs. Terwilliger

Many of our freshmen walk through our doors not knowing how to send and receive emails, upload and download files, change file formats, and maneuvering around the computer. As our seniors leave us, they have computer skills that will make them competitive in any job market. - Mrs. Willson

I believe having a 1:1 high school experience will help me later on because it has taught me to be responsible with an item that is necessary for my work. I learned how to be held accountable for having and maintaining my computer and knowing how to use it. This is similar to the expectations that most jobs and colleges will have, and I feel more prepared to meet those demands. -Senior Ty Cook

What difficulties have you encoun-

Some kids learn better by writing out the information they need. Using the computers causes them to have to do double duty because they type their notes in class but re-write them to review. - Mrs. Terwilliger

I face difficulties with knowing the balance between paper and computer. When to take notes down by hand or when to quickly type them. -Senior Baylee Streit

Students have had to adjust fairly quickly to using a computer to do an assignment that would have been on paper before. For students who are not frequent computer users this is a very slow learning process. - Mrs. Terwilliger

I had a difficult time getting used to a MacBook, since I had minimal experience with computers. The MacBook also raises expectations for keeping track of our school materials and assignments. - Senior Ty Cook

It has become harder to do classroom management due to having computers. Students get sidetracked very easily with games, messaging, etc. They would get distracted before the laptops, but it is worse now. - Mrs. Wickstrom

When students or teachers have technical difficulties and the lesson is computer-based, the teacher must have an alternate lesson ready to go or be flexible while the problem gets fixed. - Mrs. Wickstrom

# District shares winter weather, emergency procedure reminders

As the temperature turns cold, the district prepares for the potential of winter weather.

When winter weather strikes, the district monitors temperatures, wind chills, and road conditions, and will inform parents as early as possible if a decision is made to cancel school. Cancellation information will be shared through the district's automated calling system (SchoolMessenger), Wildcat Alerts text messaging, Facebook, Twitter, the district app, and the website and on local TV stations.

Safety is priority number one when making the determination to cancel school on any given day due to inclement weather. If snow, ice, or extreme cold make conditions unsafe, the district will cancel school.

There may also be days when the decision is made to delay the start time of school as conditions are expected to improve.

On these days and other days

when it's very cold, there are a few reminders for parents...

- Please make sure that your children come to school dressed for the weather, with winter coats, hats, and
- If a child walks to school, we ask that parents try to make arrangements for the child to be given a ride to school. In some neighborhoods, parents form emergency carpools and this works well.
- If the child is a bus rider, we again encourage parents to make sure their child is dressed appropriately. We also encourage parents to let the child wait in the car with them until the bus comes (or, again, make arrangements so that several children can wait together in one car).

Being in school is important for many reasons, including that instructional time is valuable to all students. Additionally, schools are safe places to be for students. Students have adult supervision throughout the day

and, should they stay home on a cold day, in some cases there may be no supervision available.

In addition to preparing for winter weather, the district also continuously reviews safety procedures for other emergency situations. Students and staff participate in drills throughout the year including drills for tornado, fire, and lockdown.

In an emergency, student and staff safety is the primary focus. The district will communicate with parents as quickly as possible with the information available at the time. The district will use the district's automated calling system (SchoolMessenger) and Wildcat Alerts text messaging to communicate during an emergency.

Parents are encouraged to refrain from calling or coming to the school as it is important to keep the streets, parking area, and phone lines open for emergency responders and communication.

During a lockdown (including weather-related lockdowns), no one will be permitted to enter or leave the building with the exception of district personnel, law enforcement, and first responders. Once it has been determined that the threat has passed (all-clear), the school will resume normal procedures.

In some cases, students and staff may need to evacuate the school. Evacuation sites have been established, but the district does not publicize those locations prior to an emergency to maintain student safety. If it is determined that students cannot return to school, the district will begin reunification procedures. At that time, parents will be notified of the reunification site and steps to follow. Only parents or those listed as emergency contacts will be allowed to pick up a student and they will be required to provide photo identification.

# School attendance plays important role in student success

School attendance can have a major impact on a student's academic success starting in kindergarten and continuing through high school. Even as children grow older and more independent, families play a key role in making sure students get to school safely every day and understand why attendance is so important for success in school and in life.

The district emphasizes attendance through information sent home to parents, recognition of students and classes who achieve good attendance, and regular communication to families whose students miss school.

The state measures our district's attendance for accreditation purposes by looking at the percent of students who are here 90% of the time. The goal is for 90% of students to be in school 90% of the time.

The district realizes that some student absences are unavoidable due to health problems or other circumstances. This can be especially true in the winter months. Therefore we encourage students to prac-

proper tice handwashing and sneezing/coughing techniques, avoid sharing personal items or food, and dressing appropri-

It's not just full days, but every minute a student matters when it

comes to their opportunity for academic success. A few things for parents to consider...

Try to schedule appointments on days off or after school. However, if you have to schedule an appointment during a school day, please try to only take your child out of school for the actual appointment.

Please be sure that your student arrives to school on time every day. Try to avoid checking your child

out early. The district also wants to stress the importance of developing good attendance as a habit. If students learn the importance of being on time

"Attendance is a very important factor our managers consider when completing our employees' annual performance reviews. A poor attendance record can lead to a lower evaluation score, which in turn hurts the employee's ability to earn the highest possible pay increase under our merit program. As my former boss and mentor used to say, '99% of success is showing up.' I have found that to be true time and time

"Although employers are willing to help employees develop skills, most expect workers to already possess work ethics. Employee work ethics -- such as teamwork, respect, appearance, productivity, attitude and attendance -- are behaviors and attitudes people bring to the workplace. Although education, training, and experience are important, employers increasingly look at work ethics as equally important in hiring or retaining employees. Attendance, like all work ethics, affects every aspect of the workplace and the business."

# Bright Futures seeks to reach all children, community

Bright Futures Harrisonville is in its fifth year of supporting students and families in the community. The initiative seeks to help students achieve success by matching student needs with resources through partnerships between the schools and the community.

The Bright Futures network is made up of volunteers from the business, faith-based, social human services, parent, and school partnership areas.

Bright Futures initial work focused on setting up programs and connections to meet student needs. Programs include the Food 4 Thought backpack program, the Cats Basement (a clothing, hygiene and school supply resource area), the Just 4 Me summer food program, the Holiday Adopt-a-Family program and more.

This year, Bright Futures has established three goal areas to expand the work. The goals fall in the areas of providing positive adult role models, expanding education and awareness throughout the community, and creating service learning opportunities for students.

Several programs focus on positive adult role models (see box at left). One in particular is the McEowen Classroom Partner Program. Six classes at McEowen are piloting this program which matches a classroom with a business or orga-

nization partner. Mrs. Gordon's fourth grade class is matched with Hope Haven.

"They've provided snacks and supplies for us, but the best part has been the quality of investment poured into the kids themselves. I have been amazed at the positive relationships forged between my students and the staff," said Mrs. Gordon.

In addition to providing resources, representatives from Hope Haven visit the

class regularly and many times bring along their therapy dogs. Students in the class have been part of the Hope Haven float in the Burnt District parade (see photo below) and made ornaments to give to Hope Haven donors.

"We hope that the children have increased confidence and security knowing that a group of adults took an interest in them and their accomplishments, that we want what's best for them and we want to see them succeed, that we care about them unconditionally and that we think they are pretty important," said Hope Haven Executive Director Charlie Jennings.

Other classroom partners include Commerce Bank, Absolute Health Chiropractic, Edward Jones-George Morse, Girl Scouts, and Show Me Auto Mall.

Harrisonville Middle School is leading the charge in the area of service learning. Students began the year by learning the difference between community service and service learning. Each class at the school voted on an area to study, identify problems and seek solutions. Sixth grade chose safety; seventh grade is working on oral health; and eighth grade selected food insecurity.

Interested students can attend a special service learning class once a week during Wildcat Time to re-

search and discuss their issue and work on projects. Some progress has already been made. The eighth graders spent an afternoon at the Shepherd's Staff Food Pantry organizing and shelving food; the seventh graders are working on a partnership with the Cass County Dental Clinic; and the sixth grade helped with an anti-bullying assembly in early December.

All grade levels are finding ways to share the information they learn with the rest of the school, such as posters, flyers, announcements, etc.

In addition, all service learning students have worked on several projects together including writing letters for veterans attending the school's Veteran's Day assembly; painting pumpkins for residents at a local nursing home, and helping with the Food 4 Thought Backpack program.

Many people see Bright Futures as helping only a select group of students and families, however each of these programs works to ensure every child has the tools they need to be successful students who in turn become productive and self-sustaining citizens, loving parents, responsible neighbors, and outstanding employees. By providing positive adult role models and introducing the concept of service learning, Bright Futures is reaching all students.
