#### preschool enrollment dates set for 2018-19 Kindergarten,

Harrisonville Early Childhood Center is making kindergarten enrollment easier with information, enrollment packets, videos and appointment scheduling all online.

Parents of 2018-19 Harrisonville Schools kindergarten students can access enrollment information and videos and schedule their kindergarten enrollment/ screening appointment at www.harrisonvilleschools.org; click on Kindergarten Enrollment for 2018-19.

For those who do not have Internet access or have additional questions, a Parent Information Night for parents of 2018-19 kindergarten students will be Thursday, March 22, 6-7 p.m. at Harrisonville Early Childhood Center, 500 Polar Lane. Students are not required to attend this meeting. Parents will be able to view the ECC informational videos, pick up an enrollment packet, ask questions, and sign up for a screening appointment.

Enrollment and screening for Harrisonville kindergarten students for the 2018-19 school year will be held April 5-6 and April 9-11 at the Early Childhood Center. Parents need to call the Early Childhood Center, 380-4421, after March 22 to schedule an appointment if they are unable to sign up online or can-

not attend the Parent Information Night event.

To be eligible for kindergarten, children must be five years of age before July 31, 2018 and must live in the Harrisonville school district. Parents must bring a certified copy of the child's state issued birth certificate and his/her current immunization records to enrollment. A proof of residency such as a current utility bill will be required in August.

Preschool enrollment for 3- and 4-year-olds will start on April 23 at 6 p.m. at the Early Childhood Cen-

Children who turn three by July

31 have the option of Monday/ Tuesday morning classes or Monday/Tuesday afternoon classes.

Children who turn four by July 31 have the option to attend Wednesday-Friday morning classes or Wednesday-Friday afternoon classes.

Enrollment in preschool is on a first come, first serve basis. To finalize enrollment in preschool, parents must bring a certified copy of the child's state issued birth certificate and his/her current immunization records.

# Students, teachers prepare for spring testing

I hope everything is sunny with you and yours. With Spring comes state testing. Our district participates in



MAP testing for grades 3-8, and EOC (End of Course) exams for some 8th through 12th graders. We want all our students to do their best on all tests. Even though MAP testing isn't for a grade and EOCs can make up a small percentage of a student's grade, these tests are factored into our district's report card from the state. Below is additional information and some tips for state testing.

**MAPTesting** 

The Missouri Assessment Program is an annual standards-based

test that measures specific skills defined for each grade by the state of Missouri. It assesses students' progress toward mastery of the Show-Me Standards which are the educational standards in Missouri.

All students in grades 3-8 in Missouri will take the grade level assessment. English languagearts and mathematics tests are given in all grades. Science is administered in grades 5 and 8. HES will start testing the week of April 17, with McEowen starting the week of April 23. HMS will test the first week of May. All MAP testing is scheduled to be completed by May 11. EOC Testing

End-of-Course assessments are taken at the end of specific courses regardless of grade level. Since the 2014-15 school year, districts must ensure that students complete EOC assessments in Algebra I, English II, Biology, and Government prior to

high school graduation. For students who completed the Algebra I EOC in their 8th grade year, Algebra II is the required high school mathematics assessment for accountability purposes.

HHS will give EOC Exams between April 23 and May 4. Students currently enrolled in Algebra I, Biology, English II, and Government will participate in these state assessments. Any student who completed Algebra I in middle school and is currently enrolled in Algebra II will complete the Algebra II EOC exam.

Exams for Biology, English II, and Government will be given during the week of April 23. Algebra I and Algebra II EOC exams will be administered during the week of April 30. Students will complete the assessments on their MacBooks. Test-Taking Tips

During your student's testing

days, it is important to remember a few testing tips:

- -Please make sure your student is present and on time to school all testing days.
- -Your student should have a healthy breakfast before testing .
- -Make sure your student gets plenty of rest the nights before testing.



Two Harrisonville High School FBLA members qualified for State contest by earning top places at the district contest in mid-February. HHS senior Nick McCleave took first in Business Law and junior Ayllip Khieu earned first in Spreadsheet Applications. Both will compete at the State FBLA contest in Springfield in April.

Harrisonville Middle School stu-

dents will compete at the State Science Olympiad with strong finishes at the regional competition. The top individuals in each event and top four teams at regionals qualify for State which will be held at Westminster College in Fulton on April 7. One of the HMS teams took fourth place at the event and three individuals qualified based on their first place finishes at regional competition. Connor Everhart took first in Hovercraft and Kylie McGee and Madelyn Wilson earned first in Towers. Team members on the state-qualifying team include Venessa Butler, Makiah Clark, Madison Costner, Everhart, Katie Fitzgerald, Piper Foreman, Emily Joseph, Roman McDermed, McGee, Diego San Nicolas, Kayla Schuhler, Alex Sheldrake, Kaylee Turner, Wilson, and Collin Wyzard.

In mid-March, Special Olympic athletes competed at State in bowling and basketball. State was held in St. Joseph and competitors included Kyla Heppler, Derek Bedsaul, Chase Smith, Elijah Skoropat, Hailey Callahan, Will Charlton, Joe Puryear, Krista Britt, Sylvia Thrift, and Deserae Chiles.

In January, two HHS musicians performed at the Missouri Music Educators' Association Conference at Tan-Tar-A as part of the All-State Choir and All-State Band. Junior Zach Austin was named All-State Band - Trombone during auditions in Columbia on December 2. Junior Peyton Holden was named a member of the All-State Choir during auditions at Oak Grove High School on October 14.

This fall, the Wildcat soccer team made their first-ever trip to

State bringing home a fourth place finish. In addition, the team was awarded the Missouri State High School Soccer Coaches Association 2017 Team Sportsmanship Award. Individual All-State honors went to 1st Team, Seth Wiebusch and Connor Blentlinger; 2nd Team, Brody Pitts; and Honorable Mention, Alex Bearden.

Cross Country runner Kaylee Harp, a sophomore, competed at the State Cross Country meet for the second year in a row.

Senior Nick Kruse made two All-State teams - he earned 2nd Team All-State honors in football on defense and then in February, Kruse earned second place at the State Wrestling Tournament.


Wildcat wrestler Sam East, a

# Bright Futures Partner program builds positve relationships

The Bright Futures Classroom Partner program connects a classroom at McEowen Elementary with a local business with the goal of providing positive adult role models for students and building relationships between them.

Partners can take on a variety of roles in the classroom. For Mrs. Natalie Johnson, her classroom partner, Serenity Care Hospice, demonstrates what it means to be a good community member.

"They are very involved in our community and share that with the students," said Johnson.

And they invite the students to join with them in their service activities. The students participated in a military balloon release at a football game in the fall and helped with a Veteran's Day event.

Andrea Murphy with Serenity said, "Having the involvement of the students and teachers has really added enthusiasm to our projects."

Other partners bring a bit of help during their classroom visits. Hope Haven is partnered with two classrooms and they often bring their therapy dogs. Mrs. Megan Gordon's class refers to Hope Haven as "The Dog Squad" while Mrs.

Kelli Neal's class calls them "Furry Friends."

Gordon said, "This is especially therapeutic for my students who struggle with special needs, anxiety, and shyness. The best part is by far the friendships that have formed with both humans and canines alike!"

Hope Haven gives their classes tangible support such as school supplies and snacks, but the time they give is the most important part of the partnership.

"I've seen my students become more confident sharing ideas and having discussions thanks to the time invested by our community partner," said Gordon. "We have bi-weekly visits during which the volunteers read with my kids, allow them to brainstorm writing ideas or share projects they have completed, and make presentations."

Hope Haven was one of the partner program's founding participants during the 2016-17 school year, while PressurePro is one of the newest, getting started with Mr. VanSlyke's class this fall.

PressurePro's Vanessa Hargrave said, "In just the few months we've been working with our class, we've not only gained

pretty great relationships with the kids in our class, but also a great relationship with Mr. VanSlyke, which is exciting as we look to continue our partnership in the years to come with him and his classes."

plete

their Bright Futures #My42 Service Award. To earn the award, the students need to participate in five service activities during the school year including a service learning project.

Hargrave said, "We are currently working to help every child in the class identify, research, take action on and present their ideas for the service learning project. We have four groups currently focusing on hunger, animal care/cruelty, environment, and caring for the elderly."

PressurePro volunteers are helping the students connect with community experts and resources to come up with ways the students can make an impact.

In addition to the academic support and relationship building, the partners also visit the classes to simply have fun. Hope Haven helped with Mrs. Neal's class Valentine party and PressurePro led a Thanksgiving craft activity with the students.

The program's impact extends beyond the classroom.





"The relationships with the students has already included outside of the classroom run-ins and check ins (when we see them with parents at the grocery store and other places), which is neat as it open up an entirely new level of awareness and – as we see it – camaraderie within our community," said Hargrave.
